Why Higher Education?

- Essential for some career paths.
- Develop new transferable skills and subject knowledge.
- Increase your confidence and independence.
- Broaden your experiences.
- Show yourself what you can do.
- Invest in your future.

Types of University Course

- Single: study one subject.
- Joint honours degree: divide your time 50:50 between two subjects.
- Major/minor: study two subjects, normally at a 75:25 ratio.
- Combined honours programme: study between two to four subjects, specialising in just two subjects in years two and three.
- Modular courses: build a personalised course by choosing modules you're interested in.
- Sandwich courses: courses with one year in industry or a year abroad.
- Foundation year: if you don't have the right qualifications, some universities and colleges offer this to help students prepare for and enter higher education.

Do you want to study abroad?

- Every year we have students apply to study abroad
- This is something that needs a lot of research as funding is different in every country
- Scholarships may be available (eg sports scholarships)
- US University information can be found at the Fulbright Commission website

What's right for you?

- There are a number of things for you to consider when applying for higher education, such as:
- Is it a subject you enjoy you are investing time, money, and effort
- Is it right for your career path check with employers
- What is the location like? city or rural, transport links
- Does the course offer a study style that suits you?
- extracurricular activities- what is there?
- finances

Choosing a Course

- Research courses you are interested in- content can vary between universities.
- Think outside of the "traditional" subjects- did you know you could study Zoology, Immunology, Footwear Design and even Brewing and Distilling at university!!!
- Look at entry requirements- be realistic, use your predicted grades as a guideline and try to pick courses with a range of requirements.

Open Days

- Students are encouraged to attend open days and are allowed up to 3 authorised absences for this.
- They are a good opportunity to visit a campus and the local area
- A fantastic way to see how the university "feels"
- A chance to take part in subject lectures, hear speakers talk about university life, take tours of the university and accommodation and speak to current students
- Find out when open days take place by visiting <u>www.opendays.com</u> and university websites
- Due to pandemic, many universities had virtual open days uploaded on to their websites, which are still there for you to look at. However, the majority are now offering on site events

Oxbridge, Medical, Dental and Veterinary

- Not for everyone. Needs careful reflection and research
- Early application UCAS deadline of 16th October
- Most courses require pre admission tests which need preparation
- We will offer regular support tutorials, lunchtime preparation sessions and mock interviews
- A good candidate will have academic ability and potential, GCSEs at grades 8 and 9, and A grade AS Levels. They will have a genuine interest in their subject, a thirst for knowledge and be prepared to see things differently.

Russell Group or not?

- The Russell Group is made up of 24 world-class universities which receive the majority of the research funding in the UK. These institutions share a strong reputation for teaching and learning and attract staff and students from around the world
- They are well-funded, have a high status and are often found at the top of league tables
- For many students, a Russell Group institution will be the right option, but assuming that it is the only option worth considering can be limiting.

Russell Group or not?

The UK university landscape is diverse, ranging from tiny, specialist colleges to sprawling city campuses; from universities known for academic excellence to those known for impressive employer links.

- There should be something for everyone, but it is a question of finding the right fit.
- Non-Russell group universities can have better satisfaction ratings
- There may be more emphasis on work experience and building industry contacts
- May be better fit creative courses/healthcare
- The Times University of the Year 2023 is the University of Bath a non Russell Group University

UCAS

- Application is entirely online.
- Maximum of five choices.
- Some choice restrictions: medicine, veterinary medicine/science, dentistry(maximum of four)
- Oxford or Cambridge
- Simple application cost: £27.50
- 'Invisibility' universities cannot see where else applied to

TEAMS groups

 Year 12 students are able to add themselves to SHSB TEAMS groups which concentrate on different Post 18 pathways ie Oxbridge, Apprenticeships, Medicine, Careers in Engineering, law, business and finance etc. Please make sure your student has added themselves to the groups they may be interested in.

• All opportunities for work experience/university master classes/job vacancies/open days are added to these groups.

The School Process

- All students will start their UCAS online application as part of the summer personal development programme in June 2023.
- A draft personal statement should be completed by the end of the summer holidays
- Students will be issued their predicted grades in early September. School policy states that your predicted A Level grade will be your AS Level grade.
- 5 university choices can then be finalised, and their pre UCAS form completed and handed in to Mrs Hamilton by the 16th November (27th September for Early Entry students)
- Online applications need to be completed (including a personal statement) and the "pay and send "button pressed by 6th December (6th October for Early Entry students) to guarantee applications are processed before the UCAS deadline date

The Personal Statement

- The only opportunity to sell yourselves to your prospective university within 4000 characters!
- What you can do to start preparing now:

Engage in wider reading (including watching online lectures, listening to podcasts, taking short online courses-MOOCs)

Relevant visits e.g. museums/exhibitions

Work experience (vital for vocational courses)

Go beyond your current learning- is there something you are interested in that you would like to find out about? Then you should do it!

Work Experience/Shadowing

- Year 12 students have been regularly offered the chance to apply for virtual work experience opportunities via organisations such as InvestIn, Springpod and Speakers for Schools.
- Students are encouraged to seek out work experience opportunities through networking, friends and family, contacting local companies.
- Aspiring medics have all been offered the chance to apply for the Southend Hospital work shadowing scheme

Decisions

Once your UCAS application has been received by the universities they will review the:

- personal statement
- reference
- qualifications
- admissions test result
- interview
- portfolio
- audition

They'll then make one of three decisions: Unconditional offer

Conditional offer

Unsuccessful.

This can take some weeks, universities have until May 2024 to make a decision

Replies

- Applicants should wait for all decisions from all choices, then they can choose one:
- firm if all conditions are met, this is where they will be placed
- insurance usually lower conditions, in case firm conditions are not met
- Any other offers must be declined.
- If a student firmly accepts an unconditional offer, they must decline any/all others.

How can parents support?

- Use the parents/guardians' section of the UCAS website at www.ucas.com/parents
- Use the UCAS parent information tool for advice, hints, and tips to help someone you care for through the application process.
- Offer to attend open days you may have a different perspective.
- Don't book family holidays at key times.
- Make sure you read everything carefully that is sent to you.
- Sign up for your UCAS monthly parent newsletter.

What do we have planned?

- Tuesday 6th June Year 12 return to school
- Wednesday 14th June Year 12 attend the UCAS fair at the University of Essex, Colchester
- Rest of the term, a summer development plan will be followed by all of year 12 where they will look at various post 18 options, start an online UCAS application and hear from guests about how to make choices
- 13th July- Year 12 attend a presentation from Jane Marshall on the importance of personal statements and how to write them.
- 21st July End of term- please take some time through the holidays to start to draft your personal statement.











The levels of apprenticeships



Name	Level	Equivalent educational level
Intermediate	2	5 GCSE passes at grade A*-C or 4-9
Advanced	3	2 A Levels / Level 3 diploma / international Baccalaureate
Higher	4,5,6 & 7	Foundation degree and above
Degree	6 & 7	Bachelor's or master's degree



- You'll need to balance working and studying at the same time.
- You won't qualify for any student loans.
- Apprentices don't always get the traditional 'university experience'.
