DEVELOPING

ASSURED

Demonstrating confident learning, in line with our school expected standards

~10th -70th percentile

THRIVING


Comfortably performing above our school expected standard

Engaged in learning far above the school expected standards


~90th-100th percentile



Compulsory and Options subjects

Compulsory Subjects:

English, Maths, Science, 1 Modern Foreign Language (MFL), Religious Studies (RS), Physical Education (Games)*, PSHE*

* Non GCSE courses

Options:

Geography, History, Art, Drama, P.E (Exam), Music, D.T. Systems <u>or</u> D.T. Polymers, Business Studies, Economics, Computer Science, Citizenship & Food Science.

You should note the following...

- 1. Courses will only run if there are sufficient numbers;
- 2. In some cases, capacity in certain subjects is limited;
- 3. You are advised to choose your options based on what you enjoy doing and what you are good at. You will have far more success this way.
- 4. Art will carry just as much 'weight' when applying for sixth form than History*** Drama will carry just as much 'weight' as 'Economics'****

Frequently Asked Questions

Why has my son gone from having 7 options to only choosing 3 options (2 if he chooses triple science)?

Ten GCSEs are enough to study and succeed in light of 2017 government changes to the GCSEs and harder specifications. The new specifications that your son is studying have more challenging content. Many now have numerous 'closed' examinations at the end of the course. Recall is a key skill and this could be lost if more GCSE's are taken.

Why does my son have to study full GCSE RE?

RE is a full course that ALL pupils will be studying, it is not one of the options. The main reason is that the course fits with the school's 20:20 vision of spiritual, moral and social development. This allows for PSHE to be tailored and more specific to trends.

Frequently Asked Questions

If my son chooses Double science can they still do a specific science at A Level?

Yes of course they can still complete this at A Level. Naturally, if you have studied a specific science for two years you will have a stronger understanding, but we have many students in the past take Double Science and still successfully study a science at A Level.

If my son completes further maths, will he have extra lessons to complete this?

Your son will be receiving 7 lessons of Maths in Year 10 and 11. If he completes further maths, there will be no extra lessons of maths timetabled.

Why only 10 GCSE's?

Reading teachers' and students' accounts of the <u>immense stress and mental</u> <u>health issues</u> caused by the introduction of the new GCSE exams this year is heartbreaking.


"The new GCSEs have broken my best students, left some with serious stressinduced illnesses, and isolated the majority, leaving them completely apathetic towards their own learning," said one teacher.

A student reports: "I have seen the mentally toughest people crack and it's painful to watch. People crying over being unable to do a maths question. Is this what we want as a nation, to be put under this mental stress?"

I'm not saying that adolescents should be spending their time in school doing whatever they want. But there should be time left outside of school to pursue other things, whether it's music or video games or making YouTube videos or just being teens. Exams may be a necessary evil, but there should be time and space left over for young people to live their lives and discover their passions, instead of piling so much schoolwork on them that they are having panic attacks and migraines en masse. 
